



2020 Invasive Plant Patrol Efforts

Invasive plants and animals continue to be the number one threat to the health of Little Ossipee Lake. Reasons for this include: a changing climate, the lake's proximity to route 5, and the unattended boat launch. Should an invasive plant such as milfoil be found in the lake, the negative consequences can be profound. Loss of property value and difficulty swimming or boating are just some of the unwanted issues.

Even with this high level of threat, recruiting individuals to join the IPP team remains an ongoing challenge. The Little Ossipee Lake Association was unable to complete a formal survey of the entire lake last summer because we did not have enough helping hands.

However, there does seem to be an awakening. Our fearless leader of the IPP team, Deidre Donovan, received nearly one call per summer month last year, from property owners who noticed unfamiliar plants in their waterfronts. Fortunately, after a thorough investigation, none of the plants were found to be invasive. The word is getting out.

The Association now owns a clear kayak that can be used to monitor shorelines. If you are interested in using this tool to check your own waterfront, please be in touch. The more eyes on the water the better chance we have of early detection. After all, knowledge is power. Due to Covid-19, there will not be a formal survey in partnership with the Lake Stewards of Maine group, so it is especially important that we remain vigilant in checking on our own shoreline. Please remember to clean, drain, and dry your boats and equipment, and should you have a question about a plant in the water, you can reach out to Deidre via email at DDonovan89753@gmail.com.

Caring for Our Lake ... and Each Other

This year's official Lake Cleanup Day has been cancelled, due to the social distancing measure we all must observe for our safety. But, our lake still needs constant care to maintain its health and beauty. This year it will be more important than ever to steward the lake as we enjoy the season. Please remember the following:

- If you see trash, whether it's yours or someone else's, please pick it up and dispose of it properly.
- Respect our wildlife. Please enjoy wildlife from a safe distance and do not offer food. If it's plant life, leave it where it is for everyone to enjoy.
- Keep it clean. Inspect your boat, personal watercraft, and all fishing gear *before* you use it in the lake to make sure no invasive plants have hitched a ride from another body of water.
- If you see something, say something. Should you notice the strange behavior of an animal, a plant that has suddenly shown up in or around your shoreline, or an abandoned watercraft floating by, the directors of your Little Ossipee Association are always available to help provide guidance.
- Respect your neighbors. The past few months have taken their toll on everyone's patience; try to be the bright spot in someone's day.

Treat the lake as it were your own... because in so many ways it is.

Lake to be Lowered this Fall

Residents and shoreline property owners take note: This fall the water level of the lake will be lowered more than usual to allow for shoreline maintenance. The lower level presents an opportunity to restore any rock erosion barriers you may have, repair docks, and make other shoreline improvements. A permit by rule is required though, so please be sure to secure a permit in advance from the state office in Portland. The address is 312 Canco Rd # 4, Portland, ME 04103 and phone is (207) 822-6300.

Remember, too, to pull your boats in time to avoid issues at the boat launch.



2020 Annual Boat Parade

The Fourth of July Terry Hackett Memorial Boat Parade will happen this year, but may look a bit different. The Association is thrilled to be able to continue this tradition, despite the ever-changing world we live in.

There are two themes to choose from this year.

Theme 1: Maine's Bicentennial, reflecting on the history, beauty and nature of the state of Maine on its 200th birthday, or;

Theme 2: Messages of Hope, asking participants to display kind, uplifting messages to help us through this challenging time.

- Follow the lead boat (a green and tan pontoon boat with the statue of liberty mounted to the front) to be sure you drive by all areas of the lake.
- The winning boat will be announced immediately following the parade in front of Weymouth's Point. Only the Best of Show trophy will be awarded. (Cash prizes are no longer being given out.)
- Please drive safely and maintain proper space in between boats, move at headway speed, and watch for swimmers. Please also ensure that none of your boat decorations accidentally fly into the water.

Water Testing

Each year members of LOLA monitor lake water quality from spring to fall. Volunteers have been collecting this data since 1977. Testing is done every two weeks on water temperature, water clarity, and phosphorous

monitoring. Test results show water quality in the lake is considered to be in excellent within the state of Maine.

Ice Out

This year the official Ice Out date was March 27, 2020. Ice out is determined by the ability to navigate a boat from one end of the lake to the other without being impacted by ice. This was an early ice out date compared to past years.

Annual Meeting, August 8, 2020

At the time of publication, it is not known whether a traditional in-person meeting and cook will be possible, but, please save the date! A virtual meeting or some variation of the meeting will take place on the second Saturday of August per the Association's bylaws. A final decision will be made in July and shared on the Little Ossipee Lake Facebook page.
