

Eyes on the Water

Lake Arrowhead now has three confirmed aquatic invasive species. Given our proximity to Lake Arrowhead, changes in climate, and a public boat launch, LOLA is on high alert.

Here is what LOLA is doing to stay ahead of invasive species:

- 2022 will be the third year of a partnership between LOLA and the town to fund the boat inspection program. Paid boat inspectors look for any plant material and remove it before a boat can enter the water. Boat inspectors are at the public launch Monday—Sunday, 6am—5pm, from Memorial to Labor Day, and then on weekends until October. We know prevention is our best line of defense.
- In partnership with the Lake Stewards of Maine, LOLA can help train new members to join the IPP (invasive plant patrol) team.
- The IPP team is planning a survey of the most critical spots on the lake (the boat launch, dam, various shallow coves) to monitor for invasive species. All are welcome!

The Power of YOU


A warming climate is already bringing more extreme weather, new invasive species, and more frequent algae blooms to Maine's lakes. While we've been lucky to experience above-average water quality for many years, Little Ossipee Lake is not exempt from these threats. Luckily, all of us have the power to do something about it!

Here are four things you can do this season:

- I. Download the Lake Stewards of Maine iphone app called "Field Guide to Aquatic Phenomena" and start identifying aquatic plants in and around the lake. This app provides reliable information for identifying flora and fauna and users can also submit pictures of suspicious nature. Find it in the app store.
- 2. Become familiar with algae blooms and report them immediately if found. You should report a bloom to both LOLA and on the Bloom Watch smartphone app, which tracks algae blooms worldwide in real time.



- 3. Join LOLA's Invasive Plant Patrol team (IPP) and become trained in plant identification. No experience necessary. Early identification is paramount.


